SPOTLIGHT DONATIONS

Swift Boats

Vietnam Veteran Harold "Randy" Beard from Godley served in the U.S. Navy on swift boats from 1966-1967.

"I felt in my heart it needed to be here in this museum. It is the only museum I've found that exhibits the River Forces of Vietnam and the Coast Guard," says Beard. He worked on a swift boat, 50 feet long and made of aluminum. He donated a 53-year-old newspaper clipping with a picture of the boat he blew up on Feb. 14, 1966.

"The enemy sank one of our boats and we lost seven men in my outfit," said Beard of his experience.

Coverlet

A 200-year-old coverlet called "Falling Leaves," was donated by David and Roberta Skelton of Hillsboro and Bill and Maria Skelton of Hawaii.

The coverlet was woven by a slave on a plantation in South Carolina, owned by William James and Lavinia Pringle Fullwood in the 1820s. It was woven on a 14½ foot hand loom in three sections, which are pieced together to make an eight by eight coverlet.

The coverlet was made of the Fullwood's cotton and wool from their sheep, dyed brown using walnut shells. It has been passed down for nearly 200 years.

U.S. Army WWII Cavalry Saddle

The M1928 McClellan Cavalry saddle was donated by Lee and Mike Smith from Waxahachie. The saddle was Lee Caraway Smith's grandfather, Joe Kenan Carraway, Jr. who was part of the 124th Cavalry.

Carraway was born Dec. 23, 1917 in Caddo, Okla., and was reared in Bellaire. At the age of 22, he enlisted

in the service and joined the 124th Cavalry of the Texas National Guard prior to World War II. On Nov. 16, 1940, President Franklin D. Roosevelt federalized the 124th, along with various other national guard units, for a one-year period. This order was later revised to the duration of the War.

The 124th was first stationed at Fort Bliss in El Paso and later transferred to Fort Brown in Brownsville, where they served patrolling the border between Texas and Mexico. While at Fort Brown, they rode from Brownsville, TX to Louisiana, and participated in the Louisiana Maneuvers. This was the longest cavalry march in U.S. history.

Spanish American War Uniform

Bill Galiga of Hillsboro and the family of Sergeant Allen R. Owens donated his father's Spanish American War uniform, aka dress blues.

Sgt. Owens was born in Cocke, Tenn. On Aug. 29, 1881. He was 21 years old hen he entered the service in Dallas on Jan. 10, 1902. He enlisted into the 16th regiment, F.S.W. Infantry, Tropical service, Company B. He was honorably

discharged on July 21, 1910 after serving eight years in the Philippine— American War.

WWII German Nazi Liberation Flag & Hitler Youth Knife

A Nazi Liberation Flag and other artifacts were donated by granddaughters of Corporal Verl Hackney, Ava Pettinger of Hillsboro, Andi Nellius of Oklahoma City, Olka., and Tifani Lee of Garland.

Hackney was from the 387th Field Artillery Battalion of the U.S. Army. He brought back the flag from the town of Remagen located along the Rhine River. U.S. soldiers would take down the Nazi flags as they liberated towns and have the flags signed by their comrades.

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
