

Dear Friends of the Museum,

The Texas Heritage Museum has had an eventful fall. To begin with, we had a members-only art exhibit opening entitled "Texas Bluebonnets" by Jean Carmichael which was well attended.

Last year's Wichita Exhibit opened in conjunction with Dr. Earl Elam's book *Kitikiti'sh*. It was so popular the museum decided to take it on the road, and now THM has its own traveling exhibit with a three-panel door displaying 20 framed, black-and-white photographs from Dr. Elam's research collection. So far, the display has traveled to Abbott ISD, West Public Library, Wichita and Affiliated Tribes Tribal Headquarters in Anadarko, Okla., Museum of North Texas History in Wichita Falls, Texas; The Morton Museum in Gainesville, Texas, and the Wise County Heritage Museum in Decatur, Texas. 
We continue to actively seek new ways to improve the fulfillment of the museum's mission. Together we are enhancing your experience – the Texas Heritage Museum Experience.

Museum Hosts "Texas Bluebonnets" Exhibit by Jean Carmichael

Jean Carmichael of Granbury, Texas, had an exclusive showing of her Texas bluebonnets paintings in the temporary gallery of the Texas Heritage Museum on Oct. 7, and it was very well attended. Below is Carmichael's biography:

"Opportunities can come late in life – learning to paint did for me! When I was born, I already had a brother, born two years prior. Billy was special – he could never walk or talk or do anything for himself, yet he would smile, laugh and cry. His eyes spoke for him. His limited life taught me many things. I entertained him by drawing and using my imagination to take us other places.

Out on a sandy land farm between Lebanon and Hickory Flat, on the edge of cedar breaks, along the Brazos River near Spivey Crossing in Hill County, life was pretty slow – there was no money.

As a teenager in school at Aquilla, Thelma Cox (Mrs. John P. Cox) invited me to paint with her a few times. Later, life took me in directions where there wasn't time for art.

A short span in Hillsboro with the Farm Bureau and KHBR – then to WFAA in Dallas. I then spent 30 years in Indiana along the Wabash River in Wells County. I married a farmer, and in our joint adventure,

Following my husband's heart attack and death, I came back to Texas. Five years later, I married "Coach" Alvin Carmichael – our move to Granbury led me to the little artist group here, and the rest is history!

Finally, at the ripe old age of 69 or 70 in 1999 – 2000 I started painting again, and it has been a gratifying experience ever since."

Hill College Press Produces 46th Book

The publication of the 46th book by Hill College Press (HCP) is in the final stages of production and will be available for circulation early 2011. It consists of Civil War letters by a German immigrant to Texas, Louis Carl Lehmann, who settled in the Brenham area and was conscripted into Confederate service in 1863. It contains extensive

commentary by a great grandson, Edmund L. Burnett, of Houston, Texas. The letters, originally in German, are presented verbatim as translated. Lehmann served in a Texas cavalry unit as a private through the Union's Red River campaign in Louisiana in 1864.


He was captured near Marksville, interned in New Orleans and released in a prisoner exchange. His letters to his wife provide unique and captivating glimpses of life in camp and on the march. Letters from his wife and instructions from him on dealing

with matters at home will enthrall many readers, conveying images of a work of fiction, but what is revealed is the story of real people, in real time, struggling to survive and do their duty, which they very admirably did, in a tumultuous era.

HCP has published books at the average rate of one per year since 1964. Recent works still in print

that would make excellent gifts for interested readers include *Reluctant Rebels: The Eleventh Texas Cavalry Regiment* (2006) by Allen G. Hatley; *Kitikiti'sh: The Wichita Indians and Associated Tribes in Texas, 1757-1859* (2008), by Earl H. Elam; and *Sunrise! Governor Bill Daniel and the Second Liberation of Guam* (2010) by David B. Gracy II.


