Hill College Press Preps for New Publication

It is our mission at Hill College Press (HCP) to publish works that relate to wars in which Texans have been a part or which have impacted Texas society. The majority of works published by HCP since 1964 have dealt with Texas and Texans during the Civil War.

However, the next work to be released by the press is a very detailed World War II story of a young Texas soldier's service with the Texas 36th Division and the 636th Tank Destroyer Battalion during the Allied invasion of southern France and into southern Germany between mid-August 1944 and the end of the war in May 1945.

Rufus Lester Leggett of Fort Worth was 17 years old when inducted into federal service with the Texas 36th Infantry Division in late 1940. In 1944, he was a sergeant in a reconnaissance platoon and with his unit every mile of the way northward into France, across the Rhine River and to the border of Germany and Austria. At war's end, he was with a detail of soldiers that took into custody Hermann Goering, who had been the 2nd ranking governmental official in Germany as well as head of the Nazi Luftwaffe.

Cpt. Galuppo Donates Abram's Well Flag

Captain Ron Galuppo has donated an American flag flown during his last deployment in Iraq while based in Al Asad. This donation includes the flag, a video of his flights, as well as photos of him and several fellow soldiers during their time on base and in surrounding areas such as Abram's Well.

Written by Leggett in the decade before his death in 2008, it is a remarkable "soldier's eye witness story" of combat in Europe in what has been called the most significant war in history. Watch for news of the book's release!

Still available in the Gift Shop and on Amazon is the engrossing account of Texan Bill Daniel's mission as governor of Guam in 1961-63. Researched and written by highly regarded historian and former Texas State Archivist, David Gracy, who was well acquainted with the Governor. Released in 2010, it is the story of what both called "the Second Liberation of Guam," the first being the elimination of Japanese rule at the end of World War II and the second being from absolute control of activities on the island by the U.S. Navy due to the efforts of Daniel and others.

HCP continues to pursue its mission of producing quality books dealing with aspects of Texas and Texans during wartime, producing in limited quantities works that may not meet the vast market demands of other publishers but which merit publication and which enhance the education of an inquiring public and the interest of select groups of scholars.





Light Crust Doughboys Temporary Exhibit

The Light Crust Doughboys will be featured from late April through December in the THM Temporary Exhibit.

The Light Crust Doughboys were founded in 1931 and reached their peak in popularity during WWII.

Under the original leadership of Bob Wills, the Light Crust Doughboys actually worked in the Burrus Mill that made Light Crust Flour. This was a compromise with the owner of the mill who was paying for them to play on the radio but didn't like their "hillbilly music." This same owner later became such a big fan of their music that he formed the broadcast company that played their music on the radio in the Dallas/Fort Worth area and beyond.

Central Texas residents may be interested to know that when the Clark family's grocery store opened in Hillsboro, the Light Crust Doughboys agreed to play for the grand opening.

Most important to popular music history, the band pioneered the "western swing" style that joined early country music with the big band ethos so popular in Kansas City and New York City, and a little blues, pop and gospel thrown in for good measure.

Not long after the formation of the group, the original group members went on to form or perform in other bands, but the Light Crust Doughboys moniker stuck through the band's various incarnations.
