Letter From the Director

The Texas Heritage Museum has had an exciting past quarter. To begin with, I am excited to announce that the 81st Texas Legislature designated the Medal of Honor Memorial at Hill College as the official state memorial to Texas-born Medal of Honor recipients. These efforts could not have been possible without the strong support of Senator Kip Averitt, Representative Jim Pitts and Hill College President Dr. Sheryl Kappus. For our memorial to receive this designation, it took two legislative sessions, more than three years of work and numerous trips to Austin. The bill designation is SCR-5 and is one of only 1,168 bills passed by the Texas State Legislature out of 7,609. The museum will have a large celebration to commemorate this event in the near future.

I am also very proud of the Texas Heritage Museum's staff for receiving high remarks with the Museum Assessment Program (MAP) national grant administered through the American Association of Museums. Moreover, I am pleased to announce

that THM has received a second national museum assessment grant.

Lastly, I am happy to announce that Kendall Milton, our curator, has installed many new exhibits on small conflicts of war in our Weapons Gallery. She has also created an exhibit entitled "Audie Murphy: Selections from our Collection" being showcased in our traveling exhibit gallery.

THM is actively seeking new ways to improve the fulfillment of the museum's mission. Together we are enhancing your experience – the Texas Heritage Museum Experience.

Medal of Honor Memorial Designated Official State Memorial



Medal of Honor Memorial

The Texas Heritage Museum's memorial has become the official Texas state Medal of Honor Memorial to Native-Born Texans by the 81st Texas Legislature (SCR-5). It will officially become law on Sept. 1.

Hill College has installed the Texas Medal of Honor Memorial as a tribute to all native-born Texans who have received that distinction, the highest award that

can be bestowed on a member of the United States armed forces. Located on the campus of Hill College in front of the Texas Heritage Museum, the memorial serves to enhance the mission of the museum which is to explore the experience of Texas and Texans in wartime and the ways in which that experience continues to affect us today.

Of the more than 3,400 individuals who have received the Medal of Honor, 56 were born in the Lone Star State. The central shaft of the memorial highlights the valor of Texans Audie Murphy and Samuel Dealey, the most decorated members of the U.S. Army and

Audie Murphy Traveling Exhibit

Currently on display at the Traveling Exhibit Gallery is "Audie Murphy: Selections from our Collection" which includes: Murphy's movie posters, original artwork, suit, script and photos from the filming of *The Red Badge of Courage*. Navy in World War II, respectively. Among the prized holdings of the Texas Heritage Museum are an extensive collection of Audie Murphy's personal artifacts from World War II, the Medal of Honor that was awarded to James Harris, a World War II tank commander and Hillsboro native, and a large number of photographs and documents relating to other Medal of Honor recipients from Texas. The Texas Heritage Museum plans to expand and develop educational programming around the Medal of Honor memorial and to invite

Medal of Honor recipients to talk about and share their experiences.

To be considered as a nominee for the Medal of Honor, a man or woman must have demonstrated conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity above and beyond the call of duty and at the risk of his or her life. In paying solemn tribute to those Texans who have exemplified the highest standards of courage, selflessness and devotion to duty, the memorial at Hill College commemorates those who have earned the lasting gratitude and respect of all Americans.

Wichita Exhibit Hits the Road

The Wichita exhibit that opened in conjunction with Dr. Earl Elam's book *Kitikiti'sh* was so popular the museum decided to take it on the road, and now THM has its own traveling exhibit! Curator Kendall Milton and Maintenance Manager Frank Williams developed a three-panel door exhibit displaying 20 framed, black-and-white photographs from Dr. Elam's research collection. So far, the display has traveled to Abbott

THM Awarded Second MAP Grant

The Texas Heritage Museum has once again been awarded a National Museum Assessment Program (MAP) Collections Management Grant through the American Association of Museums (AAM). The museum staff is excited to be awarded this second MAP grant. These grants are competitive in nature, and the AAM only awards approximately 115 nationwide on an annual basis.

The program provides a confidential process of self-study, peer review and implementation supported

through a cooperative agreement with the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS) and AAM. The museum programs of IMLS are the only federal programs solely devoted to assisting museums in carrying out their public service responsibilities.

The Texas Heritage Museum will be able to use MAP as a very valuable assessment in moving forward with its strategic plan and long-range goal of being accredited by the AAM.

Kids Kollege Invades THM

The THM once again participated in Kids Kollege. Hill College has offered this day camp for kids for four years, and the museum is excited to be a part of it. During the second week of July, students spent an hour per day at the museum engaging in

activities such as scavenger hunts, mock archeological digs and blacksmithing demonstrations. Special thanks goes to museum member Ken McElroy of Austin for lending the museum his blacksmithing skills.
