

Recent Donations to the Galleries and Collections Division

Donor:

Marvin Schroeder donated two Civil War model ships that he created: the CSS Alabama and the USS Kearsarge. Mr. Schroeder is a professional ship model builder and is a museum volunteer at the National Museum of the Pacific War in Fredericksburg, Texas.

CSS Alabama:

The CSS Alabama was built in secrecy for the Confederate States Navy in 1862 by British shipbuilders John Laird Sons and Company, in north west England at their shipyards in Birkenhead, Wirral, across from

Liverpool. CSS Alabama served as a successful commerce raider, attacking Union merchant and naval ships over the course of her twoyear career, during which she never docked at a Southern port.


USS Kearsarge:

The USS Kearsarge was built at Portsmouth Navy Yard in Kittery, Maine, under the 1861 American Civil War emergency shipbuilding program and was the only ship of the United States Navy named for Mount Kearsarge in New Hampshire.

The CSS Alabama was sunk in June 1864 by the USS Kearsarge at the Battle of Cherbourg outside the port of Cherbourg, France.


