Letter From the Dean



Medal of Honor Recipient Added to the Official Texas State Medal of Honor Memorial to Native-Born Texans

Master Sergeant Matthew O. Williams is the most recent recipient to be added to the Official Texas State Medal of Honor Memorial to Native-Born Texans. He was born in Boerne, Texas on October, 3, 1981. Master Sergeant Matthew O. Williams distinguished himself by acts of gallantry and intrepidity above and beyond the call of duty on April 6, 2008, while serving as a Weapons Sergeant, Special Forces Operational Detachment Alpha 3336, Special Operations Task Force-33, in support of Operation Enduring Freedom in Afghanistan.

Witness Tree Stump From the Civil War Battle of South Mountain - September 14, 1862

This witness tree stump was donated by Richard & Edith Hamilton in November 2018.

After many Civil War battles, all that is left is a devastated scarring battle landscape. A witness tree stump remains as a biologically tenacious symbol of that battle.

This witness tree stump most likely came from the Beachley Farm which was right in the middle of the Battle of South Mountain in Frederick County, Maryland. This stump is riddled with bullets on both sides from both the

Confederate and Union armies. The cannonballs fired in this battle splintered this tree stump to shreds.

Texas Heritage Museum Showcases Hill College Art Teacher's Prints Collection

Hill College art instructor Tom Sale's new exhibit in the Texas Heritage Museum's temporary art gallery features 40 limited-edition engravings, etchings, woodblock prints and lithographs.

The exhibit, "A Small Teaching Exhibit of Prints from the Collection of Tom Sale," is comprised of 17th century to modern dated prints Sale began personally collecting when he started teaching.

"The core of the collection came from prints my parents bought in Paris when the Louvre was still selling restrikes of original plates and from artist friends of theirs such as the well-known American printmaker, Frank Stack," Sale said. "Over the years, I have added to this collection on my own."

Other known artists featured in the exhibit include Scott Winterrowd and Noyes Capehart. Various other American, European and Japanese printmakers, such as Honore Daumier, Albrecht Durer, and Rembrandt van Rijn, are also featured in the collection.

Hill College art appreciation classes have used the exhibit to learn about printmaking techniques. The exhibit is purposefully not labeled so students can find elements of art and search for clues about the techniques without being given the information usually seen on museum tags.

"The prints are beautiful works of art with a delicate surface and fine line quality," said Sale. "We have all seen mass-produced reproductions, but to see these in person printed on quality paper is a great experience."

The exhibit will be open to the public through July 31 during museum hours.


